## What is "social care"?



### Social care is a broad term that refers to activities that prevent and address healthrelated social risk factors and social needs

- Navigation around community resources
- Addressing concerns around isolation and loneliness
- Comprehensive care management to address complex social and mental health needs





## "Tele-social care": Compiling best practices

- Social care often gets delivered telephonically or virtually (with video component)
  - Expansion prompted by pandemic

#### Context on CHaSCI's work at Rush and external sites

- Telephonic components to models, in addition to bedside + appointments
- Telephonic intervention well suited for patients in certain situations

#### Context on the Camden Coalition's work

- In-person grounding of COACH and other complex care
- Transition to virtual

Social determinants of health are increasingly being recognized as important for health care to pay attention to.

These conditions in which we live and age can be protective and associated with positive outcomes (e.g., having stable housing or supportive social connections), or they can be detrimental to one's health and wellbeing. In the latter case, social determinants are known as health-related social risk factors, and when experienced at the individual level, as social needs.

Social care - a broad term that refers to activities that prevent and address health-related social risk factors and social needs - is a core component of caring for people's health

It includes activities such as providing navigation around community resources, engaging individuals at risk for isolation and loneliness, or providing comprehensive care management that is attuned to social and mental health needs and their impact on one's wellbeing, health, and ability to follow one's medical care plan. There are an increasing number of resources to support best practices in social care provision, including core competencies for frontline complex care providers

As part of the transition to telehealth prompted by the COVID-19 pandemic, many health care institutions are also transitioning their social care activities to telesocial care.

This brief highlights strategies and implications for delivery of social care activities via telephonic or virtual video-based platforms, with a focus on care management. It is informed primarily by the experience of social work and nurse care managers at the Camden Coalition of Healthcare Providers (Camden, NJ) and Rush University Medical Center (Chicago, IL).

This brief complements other previously-developed materials on telehealth and social needs, such as the Center for Care Innovation's toolkit on Telemedicine for Health Equity and the CDC Clinician Outreach and Communication Activity's Telehealth & Health Equity webinar



## Implications of Tele-social care: Benefits and Drawbacks



#### Benefits

- May increase access to care for people who are busy
- May decrease barriers to accessing care
- Efficient
- Video platform gives visual cues of inhome environment
- Some sense of intimacy from telephonic discussions

### Drawbacks

- May decrease access to care for those who have limited access to technology
- Can be hard to assess complexity of care needs
- Can feel hard to build rapport
- Some people multi-task in conversation
- Less visibility with the care team
- Privacy and security concerns





## **Considerations for program planning & administration**

Build local partnerships and programs to address evolving needs	Be thoughtful about caseload expectations	Strategically identify patients to focus on
Adjust intervention depth and duration as needed	Pay attention to staff well-being & have regular touchpoints as a team	Don't forget about quality assurance

### Financial sustainability a challenge for social care / health care integration in general

- These challenges persist within tele-social care activities, too

### More implementation and outcomes research on tele-social care is needed

- For instance...
  - Which populations and what care contexts benefit from telephonic/virtual delivery, and which suffer?
  - Where are efficiencies gained? Where are increased time and resource investments (e.g., tablets and internet) needed to maintain access?
  - Which complex care core competencies are most likely to be embodied via tele-social care, and which are more challenging?
  - What should continue to be delivered telephonically/virtually after medical care returns to predominantly in-person?
